

Historic Name: Conrad House

Date or Period: Early to mid-19th century

Original Use: Residence

Vicinity: Manassas

A simple, two-story, frame structure, the Conrad House was built on a T-shaped, center-hall plan with a two-story, main block with matching stone-and-brick, end chimneys. Attached to the rear of the house was a two-story, frame addition containing the dining room and a centered side entrance. The front porch consisted of a stone, rectangular stoop, and the side porch was a one-story, raised, late-Victorian, sitting porch with turned posts and a cutout rail. The front of the house had an irregular window arrangement, possibly to accommodate the interior stair, which rose from the right wall of a central passage. This house was used as a Confederate hospital during the first and after the second battle of Manassas. It was torn down in the late 1980s.
